Promoting POSITIVE behaviour

Students are expected to be **responsible** and **respectful with clear and fair expectations.** They are praised for making good choices in their behaviour. This builds self-esteem and self-management skills and is part of the learning process.

Our approach is guided by our school policies— Student Welfare, Preventing and Responding to Bullying Behaviour, Safe use of Internet and Digital Technologies and (Student) Mobile Phones at School.

Positive behaviour is acknowledged and celebrated—

- every day in the classroom and playground
- at assembly with Student Awards
- ♦ in the school newsletter—Valley Views

Communication between school and home is a partnership that is integral to the development of positive student behaviour.

Teachers are very open and approachable—parents are encouraged to speak directly, use email or make a meeting time for discussion or concerns.

Response to any unsatisfactory behaviour towards others is guided by a

RESTORATIVE PRINCIPLE to promote personal responsibility, forgiveness and commitment to positive future behaviour.

In this process, a student needs to—

- become aware of the impact of their behaviour
- understand the obligation to take responsibility for their actions
- take steps towards making things right.

Students are also very aware that there are **CONSEUENCES for poor behaviour**

If a student displays **inappropriate behaviour** in class or in the playground the following **sequence will be used**—

- A reminder/ prompt/ restorative conversation
- If necessary, a follow-up warning will be given
- The student will be removed from the group or activity until acceptable behaviour is restored.
- The student will be sent to the coordinator, Assistant Principal or Principal if their behaviour is still considered to be unacceptable.

At teacher discretion, parents will be contacted for minor incidents.

Parents will be contacted for a repeated incident or if the behaviour of their child harms others.

In exceptional circumstances a student may be suspended.
